
## The Problem: Speeding on Residential Streets

Virginia Code sets the speed limit in residential areas at 25 mph. This lower speed limit allows for a greater reaction time and shorter necessary stopping distance to avoid a hazard in the roadway. Also, the faster a motor vehicle is traveling when it hits a pedestrian, the greater the likelihood of pedestrian fatality.



Failure to obey posted speed limits can create neighborhood safety problems for bicyclists, other motorists, pedestrians and particularly children, who can be hard to spot if they dart across the street.

#### Who's Speeding?

In most cases, the majority of speeders on residential streets are residents of the neighborhood. Therefore, one of the most effective ways to reduce speeding on residential streets is through neighborhood involvement and education efforts like Team Up to Slow Down.


#### What is Team Up to Slow Down?

Team Up to Slow Down is multifaceted, including a variety of tools, including neighborhood meetings, resident pledge cards, brochures, yard signage and bumper stickers.

Through these resources, and with help from city staff, neighborhoods can help educate drivers about road safety.

#### Who is involved?

Harrisonburg's Police Department and Public Works Department are partnering with you to fight speeding in our neighborhoods and local streets.



### How does my neighborhood get involved?

#### **Talk To Your Neighbors:**

Strike up a conversation with your neighbors and see if you share a concern about traffic and safety in your neighborhood. If you are interested in working together to fight the speeding problem in your neighborhood contact either the Public Works Department at 434-5928 or the Harrisonburg Police Department at 434-4436.

#### **Hold a Community Meeting:**

Once your neighborhood contacts the City, we will help you host a neighborhood meeting to talk about driving habits. Based on this conversation, the best course of action to combat your neighborhood's problems will be decided. Meetings help to ensure that everyone involved has information about the next steps

#### **Yard Signs:**

Neighborhoods who become involved in the "Team Up to Slow Down" program are eligible to receive signs to place in their yards. These signs

feature slogans that remind drivers to slow down in neighborhoods and to show drivers that you care. Yard signs may also help recruit fellow citizens to participate in the program and further raise awareness about the hazards of speeding.

#### Pledge Cards:

Because most speeders are also residents, pledge cards serve as a reminder to set a good example on Harrisonburg roadways.



#### **Bumper Stickers:**

Similar to yard signs, bumper stickers remind other drivers

to slow down.
