Notable contributions: Arts Council of the Valley awarded 18 grants totaling \$37,960, with city funds helping support numerous services.

Notable contributions: Blue Ridge Legal Services obtained 271 outcomes for 233 Harrisonburg residents and achieved clients' goals in 81% of cases. Clients' goals were partially achieved in another 17% of cases, while also recovering \$151,975 in lump sum.

Notable contributions: Mercy House is expected to reach their goal of helping 75 chronically homeless individuals to reach housing and has used grant funding to help with staffing costs.

Notable contributions: NewBridges reached their goal of serving 200 cases, with 46% of those cases including Harrisonburg residents. Because of the City of Harrisonburg's

funding, equitable legal representation in the community is feasible.
