- Our goal is to establish a Small Area Plan with recommended tangible actions to achieve the Northeast Neighborhood's vision.






Top Challenges & Community Needs

Visioning



A **Vision Statement** is a forward-looking, inspirational description of what the community wants to become. Explains where the community is now and what it aspires to be.

Elements of a strong vision statement:

- Aspirational It describes an ideal future.
- Inclusive It reflects the needs and hopes of the entire community.
- Actionable It inspires real change.
- Rooted in Identity It honors the history and character of the neighborhood.



Example Of Vision Statement

"Jackson Ward is an interconnected neighborhood that celebrates Black history, ownership, and culture while supporting a diverse community of current and future residents with quality housing, healthy spaces, and its community traditions of local arts, education, and entrepreneurship."

"Future development efforts on Cherry Avenue will respect and preserve the history and culture of the Fifeville neighborhood.

Cherry Avenue will be a vibrant mixed-use area that supports a diverse, thriving Fifeville community. New development and investment on Cherry Avenue and throughout the neighborhood will build a sense of community between long-time and newer residents and be accessible to residents at the most vulnerable end of the socio-economic scale."

Demographic Data




- Neighborhood has a higher percentage of Black and Hispanic/Latino residents than Harrisonburg overall.

- Significant 0-9 age group highlights a mix of young adults and families.






Housing Tenure





- Most of the Neighborhood has longterm residents, with many living there for over 25 years as well as new arrivals

- Housing mix includes single-family, multi-family, and rentals.




Zoning





Transportation Network



- Grid pattern neighborhood with gaps in pedestrian infrastructure.
- City transportation plan prioritizes multimodal options.
- Limited public transit affects connectivity especially for residents with personal vehicles; improvements needed.
- Safety concerns at key intersections for pedestrians and cyclists.
- Mason St: key connector to downtown, but also the "invisible wall."
